Again, our State Fire Marshal has provided a grant for FREE rooms during our event and our Association is providing FREE training to our members besides paying for the Conference registration. Legislative update By Margaret Vaughn, IFA Legislative Lobbyist

FIREWORKS TRAGEDIES

Though we were able to defeat the legislation to expand the sale of fireworks in Illinois, we have to stay diligent and remind legislators of the horrible tragedies that occurred over the 4th of July holiday (all of which could have been so easily prevented) including a fatality in

Boone County, gentleman who lost his eye in Waukegan as well as lost hands and fingers and residential fires throughout the state.

FIRE SERVICE RELATED BILLS SENT TO GOVERNOR

SB 121 ALLOWS OSHA RESIPRIATOR QUESTIONNAIRE to be DONE BY EMS - An initiative of IFA, SB 121 sponsored by Sen Neil Anderson (R-Moline) and Rep Dan Swanson, Kathleen Willis, Mike Halpin and Tom Morrison, will allow codify in the law that EMS professionals are allowed to complete OSHA respirator questionnaires for fire service personnel. After being able to complete the questionnaires for decades, the Illinois Department of Public Health decided 2 years ago that only doctors could sign them, which would put not only a financial strain on fire departments but created a hardship in medically underserved areas in which doctors are in short supply. The Department of Public Health removed their opposition to the bill which now clarifies under the Emergency Medical Services Act that EMT, EMT-I, A-EMT, Paramedic or PHRN as permitted by their EMS System Medical Director.

HB 51 - INCLUSION of CHICAGO in 10 YEAR SMOKE DETECTOR ACT - House Sponsors - Rep. Jaime M. Andrade, Jr. - Senate Sponsors - Sen. Cristina H. Pacione-Zayas and Craig Wilcox - Amends the Smoke Detector Act. Removes language providing that specified smoke detector requirements shall not apply to dwelling units and hotels within municipalities with a population over 1,000,000 inhabitants.

HB 351 - Fire Injury Reporting to Dept of Insurance - House Sponsors - Rep. Lance Yednock - Senate Sponsors Sen. Melinda Bush and Karina Villa-Christopher Belt-Robert F. Martwick - Amends the Downstate Firefighter Article of the Illinois Pension Code. Requires the fire chief of a secondary employer to report any injury, illness, or exposure incurred by a secondary employee during his or her employment to the Department of Insurance. Requires secondary employers to transmit to the Department of Insurance a certified copy of its report accounting for all hours worked by secondary employees. Effective immediately.

HB 640- FIRE ADVISORY COMISSION - ARSON INVESTIGATORS & MABAS - Adds the Illinois Chapter of the International Association of Arson Investigators and the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System (MABAS) Illinois in the organizations from which ex officio members of the Illinois Fire Advisory Commission shall serve

HB 2860: VEHICLE EQUIPMENT EXPANSION to DEPUTY & ASSISTANT FIRE CHIEF -House Sponsors Rep. Daniel Swanson, Chris Miller, Mark Luft, Jeff Keicher, Mike Murphy, Mark Batinick, Thomas M. Bennett, Tony McCombie, Norine K. Hammond and Dan Ugaste - Senate Sponsor Sen. Neil Anderson - Amends the Illinois Vehicle Code. Provides that the vehicles of deputy fire chiefs and assistant fire chiefs may be equipped with a siren, whistle, or bell capable of emitting sound audible under normal conditions from a distance of not less than 500 feet. Provides that deputy fire chiefs and assistant fire chiefs are eligible for fire chief license plates. Provides that any fire chief, deputy fire chief, or assistant fire chief operating warning devices upon a vehicle not owned by a municipality or fire protection district shall display fire chief license plates. Provides that, with the exception of permanently issued license plates, upon the resignation, termination, or reassignment to a rank other than fire chief, deputy fire chief, or assistant fire chief, a person issued fire chief license plates shall immediately surrender the license plate to the Secretary of State. Provides that the Secretary of State shall have the ability to recover the license plates.

HB 2864 RURAL POPULATIONS CREDENTIALING of RNs, PAs & APNS as VOLUNTEER EMTS - House Sponsors Rep. Daniel Swanson, Chris Miller, Mark Luft, Michael T. Marron, Thomas M. Bennett, C.D. Provides that, in a rural population of 5,000 or fewer inhabitants, each EMS System Medical Director may create an exception to the credentialing process to allow registered nurses, physician assistants, and advanced practice registered nurses to apply to serve as volunteers who perform the same work as EMTs. Requires that, as part of the volunteer recognition process, EMS Systems shall ensure that registered nurses, physician assistants, and advanced practice registered nurses have an active license issued by the Department of Financial and Professional Regulation. This system-level recognition shall require documentation and proof of the completion of at least 20 hours of prehospital care-specific coursework approved by the Department of Public Health and 8 hours of observant riding time. Provides that each EMS System Medical Director who creates an exception to the credentialing process may require additional training or documentation and may reject a volunteer applicant for just cause. Provides that each exemption period shall be no longer than one year, after which time a volunteer applicant may apply for another exemption. Provides that each EMS System Medical Director is responsible for ensuring that volunteer applicants meet EMS System requirements for credentialing and authorizing the practice in accordance with the EMS System plan for basic life support. Provides that exceptions to the credentialing process are only allowable for volunteer EMS agencies in Illinois.

HB 3763- RESPONSE TIMES STUDY PRIOR to CONSOLIDATION - House Sponsors - Rep. Daniel Swanson-Frances Ann Hurley, Chris Miller, Mark Luft, Amy Grant and Lawrence Walsh, Jr. - Senate Sponsors - Sen. Neil Anderson-Linda Holmes - Amends the Fire Protection District Act. Provides that, before a fire protection district may close a fire station or dissolve the district, a response-time study must be conducted that shows, at a minimum, estimated response times to the territory currently served by the fire station or district and estimated response times to that territory after closure of the fire station or district. Requires a response-time study before any territory may be involuntarily disconnected or consolidated with another fire protection district or municipal fire department.

SB 561 - PFAS REDUCTION ACT - Senate Sponsors Sen. Laura Ellman-Melinda Bush, Suzy Glowiak Hilton-Jacqueline Y. Collins and Laura M. Murphy - House Sponsors Rep. Anna Moeller - Creates the PFAS Reduction Act. Provides beginning January 1, 2022 that a person, local government, fire department, or State agency may not discharge or otherwise use for training or testing purposes a class B firefighting foam containing intentionally added PFAS except if the entity 1. Evaluates the testing facility for containment, treatment and disposal measure to prevent uncontrolled release of Class B firefighting foam into the environment 2. Notifies IEMA within 48 hours; n and 3. Provides training to employees of possible hazards, protective actions and a disposal plan.

The legislation does however allow fire departments to still use class B firefighting foam containing PFAs when responding to and mitigating incidents where a fire, spill, or leak of a known or suspected flammable liquid has occurred or is believed to be imminent.

Beginning in 2025, manufacturers will no longer be allowed to manufacturer or distribute class B firefighting foam with PFAs except if it can be shown that additional time is needed for compliance at which point the date can be extended to 2027.

SB 1575 - FIRST RESPONDER MENTAL HEALTH DATA - Senate Sponsors Sen. Robert F. Martwick, Terri Bryant, John Connor, Laura Fine, Meg Loughran Cappel, Steve Stadelman, Adriane Johnson, Sara Feigenholtz, Laura M. Murphy, Rachelle Crowe and Suzy Glowiak Hilton - House Sponsors Rep. Lindsey LaPointe-Frances Ann Hurley-Jackie Haas, Angelica Guerrero-Cuellar, Elizabeth Hernandez, Katie Stuart and Kathleen Willis - Amends the Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Administrative Act. Provides that the Department of Human Services shall create and maintain an online database and resource page on its website. Provides that the database and resource page shall contain mental health resources specifically geared toward first responders with the goal of connecting those persons with mental health resources related to crisis services, wellness, trauma information, nutrition, stress reduction, anxiety, depression, violence prevention, suicide prevention, and substance use and of encouraging information sharing among families of first responders, first responder organizations, first responder professional organizations, and first responders. Effective immediately.

SB 1714 REMOVAL of LABOR HISTORY from FIRE PROTECTION TRAINING - Senate Sponsors Sen. Cristina Castro - House Sponsors Rep. Daniel Swanson - Amends the Illinois Fire Protection Training Act. Deletes provision that fire fighter training schools must provide training in the history of the fire service labor movement using curriculum and instructors provided by a statewide organization representing professional union firefighters in Illinois.



Office of the State Fire Marshal



Governor JB Pritzker and Illinois State Fire Marshal Matt Perez have announced an innovative funding opportunity specifically addressing Illinois fire departments impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. A total of \$1,000,000 will be available to assist approximately 80 impacted fire departments that operate in diverse communities throughout the state. Under this one-time grant opportunity, eligible Illinois fire departments could receive up to \$15,000 in order to make up for lost donation revenues stemming from their inability to host local fundraising events during 2020. These fundraising events pay for necessities like fuel for fire trucks, utilities, and insurance.

In order to be eligible for the assistance grant the applying fire department must:

- 1) Be an Illinois combination or volunteer fire department;
- 2) Operate within a jurisdiction with a population at or less than 7,500 people;
- 3) Have an approved annual budget at or less than \$150,000;
- 4) Have an OSFM Fire Department Identification Number (FDID); and
- 5) Be current with their National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS) reports at the time of application.

The Office of the State Fire Marshal (OSFM) is pleased to collaborate with the Illinois Fire Chiefs Association (IFCA) who will create a special committee to review the grant applications utilizing a blind review needs-based analysis. The OSFM will facilitate and directly oversee the distribution of the grant awards to the recipients. This grant is financed through the Illinois Fire Prevention Fund, a non-general revenue fund that is supported primarily by a 1% assessment of the gross fire risk premium receipts of all insurance companies operating in the state.

All grant applications must be received by August 13, 2021. The application review process will begin on August 23, 2021 and end on September 3, 2021. Grant recipients are expected to receive awards by October 2021.

The OSFM continues to work with Vector (Target) Solutions to launch a time saving, easy-to-use web-based tool to help every fire department and firefighter more quickly and easily document training.

At this time, be sure that all members of your department are listed on the roster and registered for the PSE WebAccess Portal. You can find the PSE WebAccess Portal by visiting https://webapps.sfm.illinois.gov/PSEPortal/Account/Login. It will be very beneficial for 100% of your fire department's members to be listed on the roster and registered on the PSE WebAccess Portal prior to participation. Even if the department opts to not participate, it is good practice for all members of your department to be added to the department roster and registered for the PSE WebAccess Portal. Fire Departments can direct their members to the link provided to get them registered, registration is Free!

If your fire department currently utilizes Vector (Target) Solutions and your members are also registered on the PSE WebAccess Portal with a different e-mail address than they use for Vector (Target) Solutions, they should change their e-mail in the PSE WebAccess to match the e-mail they use in Vector (Target) Solutions.





The first time I saw how a fire sprinkler worked, I was a little upset ...

My name is Jordan Rodriguez. As a burn survivor, I never want anyone to go through what my family has gone through. My twin brother and I were burned in a house fire when we were 4 years old. While the rest of the family escaped without physical harm, my brother received burns on 43% of his body; 80% of my body was burned. We had many surgeries and spent months in the hospital. There was a mental toll to the fire as well. While growing up, I was bullied and often felt left out. Our mother was devastated and our older brother still deals with post-traumatic stress disorder.

When I was a young man, I saw a demonstration that compared a fire in a sprinklered room versus a fire in an unsprinklered room. I was upset because I realized that life would have been different for my family if our home had fire sprinklers. I was upset because I know how many homes and apartments do not have fire sprinklers. Now I am committed to being the biggest advocate I can be.

You can directly impact your community's efforts to reduce fire risks by adopting and enforcing the latest codes that require fire sprinklers in all buildings. A fire can become deadly in less than two minutes. Fire sprinklers are the only technology that can actively prevent a fire from becoming deadly, protecting occupants and firefighters.









From the Chaplain's Rack



How is your spirit doing these days?

As an aside, whenever I hear the word "spirit," I think of high school basketball games where the fans yell, "We've got spirit, yes we do! We've got spirit, how bout you?" Not exactly what I was meaning.

The words spirit and spirituality have an air of religion to them, which can create a reflex to want to ignore them. I get it. I'm a full-time religion person, an ordained Lutheran Christian minister in the ELCA, and I tend to recoil from churchy words, too.

If you're still with me, I want to invite us to think about spirituality in broader terms. You may be a deeply religiously person, on the fence about the God stuff, or an absolute atheist. You can be Christian, Muslim, Jewish, Hindu, Wiccan or have a uniquely local group with which you share your life. To talk about our spirituality is to talk about how we see ourselves in relation to others.

Spirituality is the core of who we are and the connections that sustain us. Spirituality is our wholeness and how we are made whole by the people who are in our lives. And when we have strong relationships and are feeling whole, we have a resilient protective force at work in lives. We have hope.

Spirituality is a little about liturgies and studies for those who use them, and more about how we look forward with anticipation and a sense of purpose. In an Army Public Health Center post from July 2020, spirituality is described as "unique to each individual, and refers to the deepest part of you. It is the innermost part of you that allows you to gain strength and hope."

Our spirit, or spirituality, is our inner resolve. To put it in better terms, it's how we put up with the stuff of life, including the stuff we deal with in the fire service. We are called out of our bunks and meals and routines to respond to someone else's crisis, and we always respond with our best training, skill, and focus. Most of the time, we'll do our jobs and keep moving. Sometimes those calls stick with us. Or they pile up. They linger in our thoughts and begin to weigh on our hearts. The military calls these heavy events moral injuries. They are the situations and acts that do not line up with our understandings of justice, safety, and right and wrong.

We in the fire service have a powerful sense of right and wrong. It is why we respond to the tones in the middle of the night or at the end of shift. It is why we care so deeply for those strangers and neighbors we will show up to serve whenever they need us. It is why the calls that go sideways, or were tragic before we showed up, can linger on our hearts and challenge our purpose. Maybe even alter our ideas of who we are in relation to others.

How is your spirit these days, friends? How is your internal sense of balance and resolve? Who are your people when the calls pile up? How are you maintaining hope? I want to invite you, as you put focus on your tactical training, to put some time into your spirit. Your inner resolve is vital, and your sense of self is necessary. Because you are necessary. Take care of yourself, take care of your company, watch out for each other.
