# LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

IFA Lobbyist Margaret Vaughn organized an annual press conference on the dangers of fireworks with the IL Fire Safety Alliance and Chicago Fire Department at the University of Chicago Comer Children's Hospital on June 30th. The event garnered great media coverage and and was broadcast on all major news networks. Speakers included Chicago Fire Marshal Ryan Ramirez, Pediatric Emergency Room Surgeon Dr. Marion Henry, psychiatrist Dr. Royce Lee to discuss how fireworks trigger PTSD and Aileen Marquez, whose daughter suffered burns on o er 70 % of her body from a sparker. A live demo was also performed which showed how quickly a shirt could be engulfed by flames by just a brief touch of a sparkler. These events are extremely vital to heighten awareness over the holiday week, as well as continuing to educate legislators that fireworks should always be left to the pros.





# From the Chaplain's Rack

The next article in my series: Why does your house need a chaplain?

One of our cadets has come to call it my "magic backpack." If you are of a certain age, or your kids are, you get the reference. For the rest of us, its what Dora the Explorer calls her backpack that she stuffs full of the supplies she finds along her adventures.

My magic backpack is yellow (because that's our color in Mt. Morris), the size of an average school bag, and goes wherever I do, whether in my car or on an apparatus. I started packing it early in my fire chaplain career, because I kept finding myself in situations where I

needed something that wasn't on me.

The contents of my go-bag reflect my role in my department, as well as the reality of being in the fire service. For instance, my backpack has a clean shirt, socks, and a hand towel. It has granola bars, a bottle of water, a high vis vest and safety glasses. There's a flashlight, a couple pairs of latex gloves, and lots of pens.

None of that is terribly unique. Three important, chaplain items I carry: a metal clipboard, emergency contact sheets, and copies of "After the Fire." Do you know about this resource? Its from the USFA and is totally free. It comes in PDF and hard copy versions and contains lots of helpful advice for families displaced by a fire.

When your fire department responds to a residence fire, who works and stays with the family to ensure their care? As a fire chaplain, one of my responsibilities is on-scene logistics for our families. I'm the one who calls Red Cross and other resources for the residents to make sure those organizations are activated. The clipboard is good for taking down information from both the residents and the resources for coordination. If those resources are coming to the scene, I'm the one they meet to ensure they get through the fire ground quickly.

Being the primary communicator and advocate for the family, I check in regularly with IC for updates. As you might expect, most civilians do not understand what it takes to fight a residential fire, or what overhauling means. Hearing glass breaking and watching ceiling get pulled creates a lot of questions and concern. The chaplain can be the one standing with the family explaining the entire process in a calm, clear manner that conveys the professionalism of the department without tasking a firefighter or officer away from their duties.

When the impacted individuals are stable, I start with my scene 360s. My backpack becomes an excellent tool for carrying lots of bottles of water to companies scattered around the incident. It gives me an excuse to be visible, pass messages between personnel, get an assessment for the family, and make myself available to our firefighters. We're not going to be doing much intervention work right there on the spot, but I make it clear I see them and I'm around for when the hoses are rolled, and the equipment is housed.

There is nothing magical about my faded yellow backpack. There is nothing magical about being a chaplain, either. However, a trained chaplain in your house could be a vital coordination and communication asset for your department. Give it some thought and give me a call if you're considering recruiting a chaplain. Until we meet at the IFA Annual Training Conference in October, take care of yourself, take care of your company.



#### Office of the State Fire Marshal



It is with a grateful heart and mixed emotions that I write this final submission. If you would have ever told me, or anyone that knew me 37 years ago, that I would have been asked to serve as the State Fire Marshal, the consensus opinion would have been to get your head examined. Every step of the way between then and now there have been people that have altered the course of my life which guided me to where I am today. My father was a policeman in Aurora and was well respected in our community for his work with juveniles

helping to turn hundreds of wayward teens into productive members of society. I wanted to be like him, so I joined the Kane County Sheriff Department. I was sent to the Illinois State Police Academy where the mantra of Integrity, Service and Pride was forever etched into my brain. After a few short years I realized that law enforcement was not the path for me and recognizing this, my wife Traci showed me a newspaper

The folks at OSFM are honestly some of the most kind, caring and conscientious people I have ever had the pleasure of working with. As I kept my eyes and ears open (and my mouth shut) they showed me what I needed to know and made me feel at home from the very first day.

Probably my most surprising discovery was that not all fire departments had it as good as we did in Aurora. I wanted that to change and worked with our people, as well as all of our Illinois fire service organizations, to develop programs and budgets that provided the best possible funding to benefit the firefighters who jumped off the trucks across the State.

The leadership in place with Acting State Fire Marshal Dale Simpson and his exec team will no doubt continue and improve the direction we have established.

Most importantly, I would like to thank my wife Traci, none of this would have been possible without her career guidance, standing by me through some very tough times and still loving me when I was probably at times unlovable. She took on the lion's share of raising our children and establishing a safe and loving home which allowed me to focus on my responsibilities. Lastly, a tip of the cap to Norman who has been my road dog for all 7 years. It has been a great ride and I am very thankful to have had the opportunity to serve in this capacity. God Bless the OSFM and the Illinois Fire Service!



Dale Simpson has assumed the role as Acting Illinois State Fire Marshal. Simpson has served in public safety for over 35 years, the last 9 years with the OSFM. #### Supreme Court Provides Important First Amendment Ruling in Boston Flag Case

On May 2, 2022, the United States Supreme Court reached a unanimous decision in *Shurtleff v. Boston* pertaining to the First Amendment. Between 2005-2017, it was a common practice for the City of Boston to allow groups and organizations to request to raise a flag on the third of three flagpoles outside City Hall. Until July 2017, Boston accepted each of the applications it received, resulting in roughly 50 flags raised over the course of 284 ceremonies held. However, when Camp Constitution director Harold Shurtleff requested to raise a Christian flag for his organization, the commissioner of Boston's Property Management Department denied the request. The commissioner worried that raising the Christian flag would show support for a specific religion, which the Establishment Clause bars. Consequently, the city told Shurtleff that his organization could raise a different flag, which he was unwilling to do.

Believing that Boston's actions violated the Free Speech Clause of the First Amendment, Camp Constitution and Shurtleff sued the city. Although the District Court and First Circuit found against them, the Supreme Court granted certiorari to hear the case. The core issue of this case, as underscored by Justice Breyer in his written opinion for the Court, was whether Boston treated the flagpole as an open forum for citizens to freely express themselves, or if the city earmarked the flagpole to convey government messages. If the Court decided that the flagpole was for government messages, then Boston had the right to forbid Camp Constitution to raise the Christian flag. Alternatively, Boston likely abridges Camp Constitution's freedom of speech if the city treats the flagpole as an open forum for citizens to freely express themselves.

In evaluating the issue, Justice Breyer turned to viewpoint discrimination, and whether Boston engaged in this type of discrimination by declining to permit Shurtleff's organization from raising the Christian flag. Here, the Court found that Boston engaged in viewpoint discrimination. The reason for this is because the city lacked an element of control regarding the flags raised and the information they communicated. In other words, the independent flags were not representative of Boston's viewpoints, but rather those of the organizations and groups who raised them. Therefore, the Supreme Court noted that the Christian flag message belonged to Camp Constitution. Thus, the justices reached a unanimous conclusion that the city violated Shurtleff and Camp Constitution's freedom of speech in forbidding them from raising the Christian flag.

One of the focal reasons why the Supreme Court unanimously sided with Shurtleff is because Boston took no active role in the flag raisings of the different organizations and groups which sent in applications. Furthermore, while Boston made it unclear whether the flags fall within the purview of the beliefs they represent, Justice Breyer referenced in his opinion a city who provides a clear message to its citizens. In California, San Jose clearly communicates that the city's flagpoles are not an open forum for citizens to freely express themselves. Accordingly, whether it be outside Boston's City Hall, or any of the city halls and other Illinois governmental buildings, it is important to consider the implications of this Supreme Court case.

In sum, Shurtleff v. Boston provides an important constitutional decision pertaining to the First Amendment and specifically, government speech. A public entity may restrict speech if it has clearly stipulated that a certain location, such as a flagpole or message board, is limited governmental speech. Otherwise stated, the public entity may prohibit speech at places denoted as limited open forums if the speech is not related to the governmental topics allowed. However, a public entity cannot abridge an individual's freedom of speech on a message board or flagpole if it recognizes these places as open forums because citizens may freely express themselves at these designated locations. Ultimately, the principal difference between open forums and limited open forums is that, with the former, the public entity is subject to viewpoint discrimination if it abridges speech based on content. With the latter, though, the limitation on an individual's speech by a public entity does not result in viewpoint discrimination.
