They need to know your needs and to be able to keep up with the changing environment in the fire service. Make them part of your team, they know how important we are to the public. LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

IFA Holds Capitol Press Conference for Passage of Volunteer Tax Credit

SB 3027 which will provide a \$500 tax credit to volunteer emergency workers, who receive no more than \$10,000 for their service, passed the Senate unanimously but was hitting a road block in the House. Though between the House and Senate, we have over 50 cosponsors, because a few state agencies had expressed their concern to the Chairman of the House Revenue Committee, about implementation and it looked like it hit a road

block and was stalled. However chief Senate Sponsor Chris Belt (D-Swansea) is extremely devoted to its passage, he held a press conference in his district at the Signal Hill FPD in Belleville on March 18th and I organized another press conference at the Capitol on Wed March 23rd on behalf of IFA and invited all legislators to participate. We had wonderful participation from legislators (17 of which came to the press conference) and great turnout from the media. The purpose of the press conference was not only to promote the passage of the bill but to educate the public on the dire shortage of volunteers and the risk to public safety it is creating. Because of the heightened public awareness of the issue, a hearing on the issue was finally allowed in the House Revenue Committee for the first time in years. Special thanks to our Chief House Sponsor Lance Yednock (D-Ottawa) who presented the bill. I testified on behalf of IFA along with Fairview Chief Brad White and East Dundee Chief Jason Parthun. A productive meeting between the IL Dept of Revenue, OSFM, myself, and several fire chiefs was held the day after the House hearing and at press time, is follow-up meeting is scheduled for several days later. We are hoping the legislation can be included in the final budget package.

HB 4461- Payment to FPD After Disconnection by Municipalities

Sponsored by Rep. Larry Walsh (D-Joliet) and Sen John Connor (D-Romeoville), this legislation addresses the issue of problems with FPD collecting money owed by municipalities required after disconnection of a district territory. If such payment is not made within 30 days following a written demand by the fire protection district entitled to the payment or which causes a fire protection district to incur an expense in order to collect the amount to which it is entitled shall, in addition to the amount due, be responsible to reimburse the fire protection district for all costs incurred by the fire protection district in collecting the amount due, including, but limited to legal fees and costs. **HB 4461 passed the House and a Senate hearing is scheduled.**

Fireworks Scare

Since January I have been working against the 3 following fireworks all of which I lead the successful efforts to beat back. I appreciate the great response from the fire service to the Calls for Actions I have put out against the fireworks legislation. It makes a big difference when legislators hear from you!

- 1. SB 3039 sponsored by Sen Tom Cullerton (D-Villa Park) to remove consumer fireworks, display fireworks and flame effect fireworks from the definition of 1.3 fireworks. The bill does not make sense from a technical aspect and goes against regulatory standards however when I spoke to Sen Cullerton, he said there was no lobbying group behind it but rather an idea he had wanted to push on his own but had Sen Rose take the lead for the past several years. After an in depth conversation with him he and calls from his local chiefs he decided not to advance it. He has since stepped down from the Senate.
- 2. HB 2898 sponsored by Rep. Rita. This is the bill that passed the House Consumer Protection Committee last year, being pushed by TNT Fireworks AKA the fictitious "US Fireworks Safety Commission" (in order to fool legislators) and we were able to prevent being called for final House vote. Because it had passed the Consumer Protection Committee last year, it was allowed back onto the House floor. The sponsor was working very hard during House deadline week to pass it and picked up several co-sponsors. After I sent a blast to legislators exposing the bill to what it really was, one of the representatives showed it to the sponsor and he backed down and did not call it. But it was a nail bitter till late Thursday night and I appreciate all the calls from the fire service.
- 3. SB 2170- Sponsored by Sen. Munoz-Sen Anderson The language is identical to HB 2898 and was defeated by one vote in the Public Safety Committee last year. Sen. Anderson had been the main sponsor but Munoz had taken over sponsorship back in January because TNT Fireworks continues to have a lobbying firm in Illinois. The bill was given life by being put into the Senate Public Safety Committee with an extended deadline but after he received a tons of calls from the fire service and meetings with him to explain how bad it really was, he decided not to advance it.

We continue to see too many headlines that note the fire department found non-working or no smoke alarms in a residence that had a fire. It's simple, working smoke

alarms save lives! The materials used in today's construction of homes and other contents are synthetic in nature which means they burn hotter and quicker. These materials also put off toxic fumes, which increase the danger of inhalation injuries and likelihood of succumbing to the smoke. If you didn't check or inspect your smoke/CO alarms to ensure they are working or expired when you changed your clocks, take a few minutes and do that today. If you find a broken alarm, don't wait, replace them! Fire doesn't discriminate, it can happen at any time! It could happen to you, your neighbor or a loved one. PSA: Watch What You Say in Closed Session!

The Open Meetings Act affords local governments a degree of privacy in discussing sensitive topics. 5 ILCS 120/2(c). Indeed, subjects involving specific personnel, collective bargaining, real estate transactions, and litigation (among others) can be discussed in closed session. *Id.* Although these sessions must be recorded, state law offers robust protections against public disclosure of closed session discussions. For instance, closed session tapes are not subject to the Freedom of Information Act, nor are they typically able to be discovered in Illinois lawsuits.

Nevertheless, what you say in closed session may still become public in at least two situations.

First, only discussion pertaining to topics authorized to be discussed in closed session will enjoy confidentiality. As part of their motion to go into closed session, public bodies must announce the gist of what they will talk about (e.g., discipline or compensation of a specific employee, pending litigation, etc.). Yet, sometimes, local governments will talk about other subjects in closed session. Other times, localities will rely on an inapt closed session exception. Discussions in these situations are not protected and, if pressed, the local government may have to disclose the verbatim records relating to those discussions.

Such was the fate of the public body in *City of Bloomington v. Raoul*, 2021 IL App (4th) 190539. There, the Bloomington City Council went into closed session to discuss termination of an intergovernmental agreement with a neighboring community. The Council cited the litigation exception, but an appellate court disagreed with that determination. There was no pending or probable litigation arising from the agreement; at most, there was a remote possibility that a lawsuit would be filed on that subject. So, the Council violated the Open Meetings Act by closing the meeting on that topic, which meant the verbatim record became public record.

For this reason, it is not only important to keep conversations to bona fide closed session topic(s), it is imperative not to assume that all comments made in closed session will forever be kept secret.

Second, even where a public body follows all the rules, closed session tapes may be compelled by federal court subpoenas. As noted above, closed session verbatim records cannot be discovered in Illinois state court lawsuits. See 5 ILCS 120/2.06(e). Nor can they be brought to light via the Freedom of Information Act. *Id.* Both of these protections stem from *Illinois'* Open Meetings Act. *Id.* However, federal courts play by different rules, and do not recognize the Act's confidentiality provisions.

The recent case of *Cage v. Harper* illustrates this dynamic. No. 17-CV-07621, 2019 WL 11704171, at *1 (N.D. Ill. Jan. 16, 2019). There, a former employee filed a federal lawsuit against his former employer—a state university. The university's board of trustees had properly entered closed session under the personnel exception to discuss terminating the employee. The employee ultimately filed a motion asking the federal court to require the board to produce its closed session tapes. The board argued that the Open Meetings Act protected the recordings, but the court disagreed. It noted "federal courts are not bound to apply state-law privileges" in federal cases due to the Constitution's supremacy clause. Nor did the court "see how the public interest would be endangered by disclosure of the requested information." In the court's view, if the employee was correct about the circumstances leading to his firing, "the public interest would likely be served by bringing the behind-the-scenes machinations of the Board to light." Therefore, the court required the board to turn over its otherwise confidential closed session tapes.

The upshot is that closed session discussions are not absolutely immune from disclosure. To the contrary, the confidentiality afforded to these conversations is fragile. If there is any defect in the closed session proceedings, then closed session recordings may not be protected. And if a federal court is involved, it might compel disclosure of closed session tapes even if a public body did everything right. For these reasons, it is vital that you watch what you say in closed session.





From the Chaplain's Rack

IFA Chaplain Josh Ehrler



The tone went off on my pager, breaking my concentration. I was in the middle of something long forgotten when dispatch called for our ambulance. The report sounded off; the way one can pick up on vibes across radio waves. Not a DOA, not exactly an unresponsive; it was an injury.

Being a small-town pastor, I knew the address. Because my senses were tuned up, I decided to head toward the scene. On my way, which only took minutes, the call had escalated to needing a landing zone. By the time I was on scene, our ambulance was enroute to the LZ. I was greeted by a friend of their family with, "I'm so glad you're here."

It can sometimes take me a few words to justify the need for a fire chaplain on our department. I'm not a trained firefighter, but I attend drills. I know how to drive nearly all our equipment and I can get our pump going. Yet, my role is not to put out fires or extricate victims. If I ride in a rig, I don't always follow the seat assignment. I probably seem to float around scenes disconnected from a company. I participate in officers' meetings and am not a tactical officer. I have a white helmet and am not a chief.

So, what does a fire chaplain do? What is our purpose? Why would your fire department need a fire chaplain?

Over the coming year, I'm going to offer ideas of why your firehouse needs a fire chaplain. It is a unique role and a vital one. And not just because we chappies are available for psych-social-emotional support.

Don't get me wrong, that is necessary. I hope we're getting past the old smoke eater, suck-it-up days when trauma and mental illness were only treated with alcohol, divorce, and addiction. I say "hope" because, looking at the statistics, we are still at risk of suicide, addiction, and myriad signs of traumatic stress. There is much work to be done. Fire chaplains can aid in that work.


Along with that, fire chaplains can offer your department support with on-scene logistics, information gathering, and crowd control. We keep the path clear and the scene easier to maneuver for fire/EMS. We can calm stressful situations and bring balance to chaotic moments. We can lead behavior health drills.

Let's start, then, with what is possibly the most controversial topic. Religious affiliation. I am Christian. My badge and lapel insignia bear crosses. My full-time job is to be a Lutheran pastor.

Yet one thing fire chaplains cannot do, and should not do, is invite people to believe what we believe. I almost never pray on scene or in the firehouse, unless specifically asked to do so. I never offer prayer as a form of crisis care. Chaplains can be Christian, Jewish, Muslim, Sikh, Buddhist, any religion. Our faith orients our work and drives our compassion, but a fire chaplain is not there to bring people into their religion. The cross on my badge is meant to show people that I am not an officer, I am a unique role in the department. I am there for them, to aid them in a time of crisis, and to stand with them through the ordeal. The cross helps others find me in a sea of turnout gear, like a white helmet ID's the chief.

More on that later. Stay tuned as we consider what it would mean to add a fire chaplain to your ranks. Until then, take care of yourself, take care of your company, watch out for each other.
