LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Volunteer Tax Credit Bill Hits Road Block at End of Session

SB 3027 which will provide a \$500 tax credit to volunteer emergency workers, passed the Senate unanimously and had gained tremendous momentum in the House. IFA organized a March 23rd press conference at the Capitol on it, which received statewide press coverage and resulted in House Revenue Chairman Mike Zalewski allowing a hearing on it (*which had never been done in years*). The Department

of Revenue was very committed to working with us and provided language to include in the bill to help them implement it. Chief sponsors Sen Chris Belt (D-Swansea) and Rep. Lance Yednock (D-Ottawa) also fought fiercely on our behalf to get money included in the budget to off- set the cost of the tax credit. However, after a series of meetings with the Office of the State Fire Marshal, the Department of Revenue, Signal Hill Chief Tom Elifff, Silvas Chief Winters and East Dundee Chief Parthun and myself, OSFM indicated they would need more time over the summer and fall to work on the logistics of implementing the bill. Since the tax reporting portion of the bill when people are filing would actually not come into play until early 2024, when people start filing their 2023 taxes, we are hoping perhaps we can get something passed in the fall veto session.

As disappointed as it was in the final hours of session not to get the bill to the finish line, we did get it further than it has ever gotten and greatly appreciated the support of our 52 co-sponsors and Sen Belt, Rep. Yednock and Rep Tom Bennett (R-Gibson City) who fought especially hard.

HB 4461- Payment to FPD After Disconnection by Municipalities

Sponsored by Rep. Larry Walsh (D-Joliet) and Sen John Connor (D-Romeoville), this legislation addresses the issue of problems with FPD collecting money owed by municipalities required after disconnection of a district territory. If such payment is not made within 30 days following a written demand by the fire protection district entitled to the payment or which causes a fire protection district to incur an expense in order to collect the amount to which it is entitled shall, in addition to the amount due, be responsible to reimburse the fire protection district for all costs incurred by the fire protection district in collecting the amount due, including, but limited to legal fees and costs. HB 4461 was signed into law by Governor Pritzker and takes effect January 1, 2023.

End of Session Fireworks Scare

There last minute was end of session horse trading which resulted in SB 2170 (the fraudulent fireworks bill being pushed by TNT Fireworks posing at the fake "US Fireworks Safety Commission") being scheduled for a hearing with only an hour's notice before the Senate Executive Committee. OSFM Legislative Liaison Katherine Nunes and I both testified against the bill but we had heard that the hearing was only being held, as a favor to the House sponsor as well as the lobbyist for the TNT fireworks, with the understanding that the bill would get out of the Committee but not advance any further on the Senate floor. However, though the bill's current sponsor Sen Tony Munoz (D-Chicago) was no fan of the bill and did not want to see it advance, he is resigning his seat in a few months, so we have to be on guard when the legislature returns, that it does not rear it's ugly head with a different sponsor. In the meantime, we are continuing to educate senators on the dire consequences fireworks expansion would bring to Illinois.





Let's just be honest for minute: families and friends involved in an incident are not always the most helpful on scene. The parent wailing in the next room. The spouse refusing to get out of the way. The friends showing up, car after car after car, clogging up the driveway and the walkway and the road.

With that said, we would do, or have done, the exact same thing. No matter our skill and experience level, if the crisis is our own, we become less effective, maybe even frustrating to be around, too. It's not about who a person is or their background, it's about what happens when humans, any humans, encounter traumatic stress.

Why does your house need a chaplain?

I'm asking you this question throughout the year. In the context of working with families and friends on scene, and the traumatic stress everyone is enduring, your chaplain can keep people clear of the scene, gather information, and do some very immediate crisis intervention that will benefit them and your personnel. Our focus is on the family and people involved, not specifically the patient or the incident, which gives us the ability to put our energy into potentially calming situations and intervening through the crisis.

Why do we as humans have trouble functioning "normally" under stress? You know the answer, and I'll tell you anyway, it's how the brain handles traumatic stress. In short, the brain shuts itself down for self-protection. SCIENCE ALERT! Our brains are made up of structures, and the oldest part of the brain, the "reptilian brain," is designed to run the basic functions. "Breathing, eating, sleeping, pooping and peeing" as Dr Van Der Kolk describes it in The Body Keeps the Score (56). When we are under stress these vitals take priority. Sometimes all a person under stress can do is breathe. Other times, they run off. Occasionally, they come at us full of unmanaged emotions. Hence the responses we've heard of: fight, flight, or freeze.

Because the higher, newer structures of the brain (limbic, neocortex) have identified a risk, they stop functioning effectively. Reasoning skills are not necessary when survival is on the line. Centralizing the duties of the brain to the basics is a natural defense mechanism. The frustrating part of this: no one gets to control how or when our brain will do it, the reaction happens to us, as it happens to families and friends on a scene.


Chaplains are trained-should be trained-in psychological and spiritual first aid. We learn how to respond to crisis with intervention skills. We can often get people talking again. We can usher family members away from the patient or off the fire ground with dignity and respect. One of our roles is to reduce the stress responses and support the family toward a clearer headspace. We simultaneously support our department by making the scene less amplified. We calmly, clearly give details to the family (what's going on, where the is ambulance going) and guide them to widen their support by calling loved ones, trusted friends, and religious leaders.

The goal is never to remove emotions, the hope is to intervene in the crisis to help people make safe, appropriate decisions. This also helps develop a stronger sense of control and wholeness. Which, in turn, helps our fire/EMS personnel function at their highest levels. If your department does not have a chaplain yet, consider how you might begin recruiting and building that role for the sake of your community and your firehouse.

Office of the State Fire Marshal



The Office of the Illinois State Fire Marshal (OSFM) announced the recipients of the 2022 Small Equipment Grant Program. A total of \$2.5 million was awarded to 104 fire departments/districts and EMS providers across the state. The program was established to provide grants of up to \$26,000 each for the purchase of small firefighting and ambulance equipment.

This program is an innovative approach to a problem that has long caused difficulties for fire departments and not-for profit ambulance services in Illinois, particularly those that have hardships in generating the necessary revenue for small equipment. The purpose is to allow eligible applicants the opportunity to purchase small equipment that they may otherwise not be able to purchase. The

OSFM received 373 applications, requesting around \$8.4 million in funding for this grant period.

Funding provided from our Small Equipment Grant Program is a huge benefit, especially to our rural volunteer departments in the state. These funds allow departments to purchase important equipment their firefighters/EMT's need to work more effectively and safely while protecting the lives and property of their community members," said Illinois State Fire Marshal Matt Perez.
