Unfortunately at press time no state budget resolution has been reached..stay tuned. Below is the latest status of fire service bills.

SB 3025 – DISCOUNTED FIRE TIRE PURCHASE for VOLUNTEERS - Sen. Haine – Rep. Bryant – Modeled after a similar program in Colorado this Fire Caucus initiative of IFA, allows volunteer firefighters to purchase four tires every three years at the government purchasing discounted rate. STATUS: PASSED SENATE

HB 5018 - PUBLIC SAFETY TELECOMM WEEK - Rep. Norrine Hammond and Sen. Anderson Designates the second full week of April of each year as National Public Safety Telecommunicators' Week, as a week to honor the dedicated men and women who answer calls for help at 911 centers across the country. STATUS: PASSED BOTH HOUSES

HB 4522 – REIMBURSEMENT for VOLUNTEER MUNICIPAL DEPTS – Rep Hoffman and Sen. Clayborne - Amends the Illinois Municipal Code. Inserts language similar to that which is already in place for Fire Protection Districts which allows municipalities to charge fees for services rendered by a volunteer municipal department to non-residents. An amendment was added in the Senate so that the maximum charge would be \$250 per hour rather than (per vehicle per hour) and also includes \$70 per fire fighter. STATUS: PASSED HOUSE

HB 5610 – FPD PROTECTION of DISCONTINUED MUNICIPALITIES. Rep. Moffitt – Sen. Anderson - Provides that no fire protection district will be required to assume responsibly for the fire protection of any municipality which discontinues its fire department unless the fire protection district's Board of Trustees has agreed to do so. Effective immediately. STATUS: PASSED BOTH HOUSES

HB 5611 – FPD ENFORCEMENT OF OSFM RULES Rep. Beiser – Sen. Haine -Amends the Fire Protection District Act. Provides that a fire chief has authority to enforce the provisions of any rules adopted and promulgated by the State Fire Marshal under the provisions of the Fire Investigation Act or to carry out the duties imposed on local officers under the Fire Investigation Act. Provides that the fire chief shall order removal or remedy of dangerous conditions including that the fire chief may order that the property be vacated until an inspection occurs and the dangerous condition is no longer present. Allows a fire chief to refer matters to the State's Attorney when a person fails to comply with the fire chief's orders enforcing the provisions of the Fire Investigation Act. STATUS: BACK in HOUSE on CONCURRENCE

HB 6041 FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT DISSOLUTION Rep. Don Moffitt- Sen. Haine - Restores the percentage of legal voters residing within the fire district territory (from 5% to 1%) that are required to petition for dissolution of a fire protection district. Provides that a loss of annual real estate tax revenues by the district from which the disconnection is sought of 25% (currently, 15%) or more because of the disconnection shall constitute serious injury and require dismissal of the petition. STATUS: BACK IN HOUSE on CONCURRENCE

HB 5649 FIRE FIGHTER PLATES for MOTORCYCLES Rep. Bennett – Sen. Barickman - Provides that a motorcycle having an engine over 150cc (rather than any motorcycle) shall be able to affix the special registration plate designated to be an Illinois Fire Fighters' Memorial license plate. Deletes the provision that the Secretary of State must issue a version of the special registration plate in a form appropriate for motorcycles. STATUS: PASSED BOTH HOUSES

SB 2947 CRIM CD-EMS-DEFINITION Sen. Connelly-Rep. Anthony - Amends the Criminal Code to and redefines various statutes concerning bodily harm directed against emergency medical services personnel and expands definition to also include all ambulance crew members, including drivers or pilots. STATUS: PASSED BOTH HOUSES

SB 3335 – EMS-EPINEPHRINE VIALS Sen. Rose – Rep. Mussman - Amends the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Systems Act. Permits EMT, EMT-I, A-EMT, or paramedics who have successfully completed a Department of Public Health approved course in the administration of epinephrine to administer epinephrine from a vial.: Permits EMT, EMT-I, A-EMT, or paramedics who have successfully completed a Department of Public Health approved course in the administration of epinephrine to administer epinephrine from a glass vial, auto-injector, ampule, or pre-filled syringe. STATUS: BACK in SENATE FOR CONCURRENCE

SB 3070 PUBLIC DUTY RULE CODIFICATION Sen. Clayborne – Introduced in response to the recent Supreme Court decision in the East Joliet PPD case, creates the Public Duty Rule Codification Act. Provides that a local governmental entity and its employees owe no duty of care to individual members of the general public to provide governmental services. STATUS: REMAINS in SENATE ASSIGNMENTS COMMITTEE



Recent legislation of note

Despite all of the battles happening in Springfield, the Illinois General Assembly did find time to adopt three statutory changes that may positively impact fire district revenues.

Rescue Fund Tax

In a move that could result in a significant increase in income for a few fire districts, the General Assembly amended Section 24 of the Illinois Fire Protection District Act. The original statute allowed a .05% tax levy on the value, "equalized or assessed by the Department of Revenue, of all taxable property within the district" for funds to pay for costs of emergency and rescue crews. The new language increases the maximum rate for the Emergency and Rescue Fund from .05% to .10%. Previously known as the "rescue nickel," the Rescue Fund rate may now be appropriately called the "rescue dime."

It is important to note that the increase in the maximum rate does not increase the district's overall aggregate rate limit. Thus, the increase does not automatically signal an increase in revenues for every district. Districts that have found themselves losing funds due to the maximum rate limits will benefit by the increase in the Rescue Fund tax rate. For those districts not already levying for the Rescue Fund, the statute requires the board of trustees of the district to submit the question of a tax to the proper election officials, who then submit the question at election. If the majority of residents vote for the tax, the board of trustees may impose the tax "not to exceed" the rate voted on. Districts already levying for the Rescue Fund do not need to go to referendum again to increase the fund rate to 0.10%.

Fire Hydrant Act Enforcement

The Illinois General Assembly also amended the Fire Hydrant Act. (425 ILCS 20/0.01 et seq.) Originally, the statute simply clarified the restrictions on the use of a fire hydrant in Illinois. Specifically, the statute clarifies the proper usage of a fire hydrant by mandating that each fire hydrant have a discharge that is maintained at least 14 inches, but not more than 26 inches, from the surface from which the hydrant protrudes. In addition, the Act provided that no obstacle could be constructed, maintained or installed within 48 inches of a fire hydrant. (425 ILCS 20/1).

The Illinois General Assembly has now authorized fire departments to recover costs from those who fail to comply with the fire hydrant requirements. (425 ILCS 20/2). Section two now allows enforcement against those "fire hydrants" connected to a water supply for the express purpose of fire suppression where the fire department can use it, and excludes flush hydrants. (425 ILCS 20/2(a)). Further, section two notes that those responsible for the hydrant must comply with the requirements for fire hydrants within thirty days of written notice of noncompliance or violation from the fire department. If the responsible party fails to comply or correct the violation, he or she must pay for the noncompliance. The responsible party can be made to pay "all reasonable costs that the fire protection district, township fire department, or municipality incurs to correct the noncompliance, including attorney's fees and legal expenses incurred by the fire protection [agencies] in recovering the costs from the responsible party." (425 ILCS 20/2(b)).

Posting of Truth-in-Tax Notices

Lastly, the Illinois General Assembly has amended the Truth in Taxation Act (35 ILCS 200/18-75) specifying what type of legal notice is required, including newspaper publishing in the taxing district. The amendment now requires that a taxing district with a website must publish the TITA notice on its website in addition to existing newspaper publishing requirements. However, a district's failure to post the notice on its website does not invalidate the notice or any action taken on the tax levy.

We wouldn't allow our children to play with an unsafe toy, nor would we use a household item that was deemed dangerous. But, when it comes to our autos and trucks, many Americans continue driving one that has been recalled because of a safety concern.

It's More Than You Might Think

The statistics are a bit unsettling – the number of recalled vehicles reached 51 million in 2015, second only to 2014's record of 60 million vehicles.

What do you need to be worried about?

Auto experts say the bulk of the recalls were for faulty airbags, which have been linked to injuries and deaths. However, other recalls were for hazards involving steering, cruise control, engines and seat belts. These failures have led to sudden loss of control of the vehicle, parts failures in a crash, or caused vehicle fires.

Many Are Not Getting Fixed

Despite a major effort by automakers, only 75 percent of vehicles that might have issues are being looked at or repaired.

Even more troubling is that the type of vehicle with the highest rate of unfixed safety issues is a family-owned minivan. SUVs and pickup trucks are a close second and third. Often, this means the drivers of those cars or trucks, maybe someone you know, is at significant risk if a part should fail.

So Why Wouldn't Someone Get the Fix?

There are many reasons why drivers aren't getting defective vehicles to a dealer or mechanic:

- They are not aware of the recall
- They worry it will take too much time or cost too much
- They just don't care
- Recall notices are often mailed to an old address

So Has Your Vehicle Been Recalled?

The government maintains an excellent website where you can check, for free: http://www.safercar.gov/CheckForRecalls

If you find your vehicle on the recall list, safety groups recommend that you contact the car dealer immediately to set up an appointment to have it looked at. Keep in mind, you should not have to pay for any parts or labor because of a recall. Not all vehicles may need a fix, but finding out will bring you peace-of-mind. And, if you think your vehicle has a defect, but hasn't been recalled yet, save any receipts; you should be reimbursed if the recall occurs later.

What Does a Recall Mean for My Insurance?

While driving a recalled vehicle shouldn't affect your insurance, the quicker you have it checked out or repaired, the safer you and others will be.

However, you should contact your insurance company if the dealer gives you a loaner car while yours is being repaired; you'll want to make sure you have enough coverage if it's more valuable than your vehicle.



This more advanced class is designed for firefighters with experience on ten actual or training fires and/or at least four years as a firefighter. Participants must be competent in core firefighting skills. Students participate in evolutions that combine engine, truck and rescue operations. Training centers on using ladders, hose, methods of forcible entry, ventilation, search and rescue techniques and SCBAs during hands-on firefighting training evolutions. Emphasis is placed on coordinating these skills during fireground operations.

Down & Dirty First-In Officer

Minimum 15 students

Friday 1pm - 5m and Saturday 8am - 5pm at IFSI

This popular class includes fireground leadership and decision making. Students learn management of resources, do size-up, make decisions on where and how to commit the first hose line and how to implement an incident command system. The class also covers personnel safety, hazard identification, size up, standard company functions, fire behavior and the variables of fire department responses. This class is designed for those responsible for commanding one to two companies at the fire or emergency scene, such as Company Officers and Chief Officers of small fire departments.

Juggling Hats: The multiple responsibilities of managing a department

Cardiac Arrest – Step away from the light; Assessment and pathophysiology; Excited delirium syndrome – the metabolic freight train to death Minimum 15 students - Friday, 1pm – 5pm at hotel

Lead instructor Jamie Temple, EMS Coordinator for Eastern lowa Community College combines these three topics into four hours of dynamic instruction.

Globe CARES (Cleaning and Repair Evaluation Services) Minimum 15 students - Friday 6pm – 8pm at the hotel Chris Moelker, Globe's Cairns Regional Representative leads this class that is open to fire service professionals who want to receive training that will assist their department comply with the 2008 Edition of NFPA 1851 Standard on Selection, Care and Maintenance of Protective Ensembles of Structural Fire Fighting and Proximity Fire Fighting. 

Acknowledgement of Risks and Release of Responsibility

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, through its Illinois Fire Service Institute, attempts to conduct its training programs in a safe and efficient manner. However, it is not possible to eliminate all of the potential hazards to a student's safety. Before any student participates in an Institute training program involving the teaching of emergency response skills, he/she should be familiar with the level of physical stress and other hazards involved. Please read the following explanations of the physical and mental requirements of this course and sign the form to acknowledge that you have read and understand the information. Students who cannot comply with these requirements will not be allowed to participate in parts of the training involving physical exertion, or the use of protective equipment. They may attend lectures and observe evolutions from a safe distance.

I acknowledge:

- 1. Practical skills training of all disciplines can be a physically and mentally stressful activity, requiring physical exertion; exposure to high temperature and humidity levels; toxic atmospheres; working at heights and in confined spaces; the possibility of elevated body temperatures, increased pulse, respiration, and blood pressures; and the ability to react quickly to emergency situations.
- 2. Persons with known heart or lung disease, hypertension, who are pregnant (Note: spontaneous abortion will occur with pregnant females when core temperature elevates), or have other medical or mental conditions which may affect their health and safety under these conditions, are advised to check with their personal, or fire department, physician before participating in the activity. The ability to meet the Illinois Department of Labor Respirator Wearers physical evaluation is the responsibility of the sponsoring department/agency and is a requirement for any course requiring the use of a self-contained breathing apparatus.
- 3. Protective clothing and self-contained breathing apparatus meeting the appropriate NFPA standards, at the time of manufacture, must be worn during most practical exercises and live fire training as directed by the instructor in charge. Protective equipment must be in serviceable condition.
- 4. Individuals with facial hair, jewelry, or other impediment to the proper seal of the face-piece on self-contained breathing apparatus will not be allowed to participate in evolutions where the atmosphere is toxic or may become so.
- 5. The use of alcohol, and other drugs, which affect mental or physical reactions, immediately preceding, or during training, is prohibited.
- 6. I am 18 years of age, or older, and an active member of a public or private fire department, public sector agency or authorized private corporation pre-approved by the Illinois Fire Service Institute (IFSI).
- 7. For purposes of promoting the IFSI, I agree to allow IFSI unlimited use of my image, with no compensation.
- 8. By the signature of the Chief/Training Officer, the department acknowledges extension of its Worker's Compensation coverage to the student. In the event of injury during training, the student is responsible for notifying his or her department to initiate the process. IFSI does not provide insurance coverage for students. Any and all injuries, no matter how minor, will be reported to the IFSI staff who will have the final say in selecting the treatment disposition for the student. This may range from on-site treatment to ambulance transportation to a local emergency department or occupational medicine agency. If a student or department does not accept these terms, or refuses to comply with IFSI's treatment decision and disposition, the student will be dropped from the remainder of the class (or program) and will not be eligible for any refund.
- 9. IFSI will not sell nor distribute your email to any outside agency, except to Parkland College, as outlined in number 12, below. IFSI will, from time to time, provide you with organization updates, newsletters, surveys and the like. Providing your email address will serve as your approval for these periodic distributions.
- 10. In order for the students, or their agency, to avoid being billed for the usual course fees, notifications of withdrawal must be made no later than 30 calendar days prior to the start of the course. This notification must be in writing. Failure to notify the Institute, as noted above, will result in you or your department being billed, regardless.
- 11. No unauthorized cameras are allowed at IFSI training or IFSI sponsored training events. The unauthorized use of cameras may lead to confiscation of the camera.
- 12. IFSI has partnered with Parkland College to provide Vocational Skills and/or Academic Credit for courses attended, where applicable. Formal enrollment information and transcript information will be available for courses delivered by IFSI after July 1, 2010, at the Parkland web site: www.parkland.edu.

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Chaplain's Corner

The Toughest Calls

The following statements are written from the street level of our fire service experience at the intersection of Faith and Trauma. May they be a help to you as an affirmation of God's presence and grace in the midst of those times when we face the toughest calls...

God has called me to serve as a firefighter and/or EMS professional in my community (or city).

God knows that His calling on my life includes the times that I will see and handle human illness, injury, trauma, pain and death.

I am created in such a way that every experience of human illness, trauma, injury and death that I respond to will impact and change me in some way. I will need to internalize emotional stress on the emergency scene in order to act professionally, competently and effectively.

God knows there will be times that I and my fire department team will be able to successfully mitigate danger, provide safety, alleviate suffering and even avert death for victims of incidents that we respond to.

But God also knows that there will be times that we will not be able, for whatever reasons, to successfully accomplish the rescue that we desire.

God knows that at times my calling will involve responding to incidents where the victims are children, relatives, friends, acquaintances or co-workers. These will be the toughest calls and will especially impact me with great emotional stress and burden.

By God's grace He grants that my internalized stress and its negative impact can be relieved by verbalizing and even expressing the emotion of my experience to a trusted friend, fellow firefighter, spouse or other family member, counselor or chaplain. We generally call this gift "debriefing". I will receive the greatest relief if that person... (1) knows and cares about me, (2) identifies with my experience, (3) can help me access further resources if necessary, and (4) can pray with me and for me to affirm faith that God will give His grace, strength, and peace.

You can simply pray this or some variation thereof...

Dear God, we are broken and burdened by what we have seen and/or handled at this incident that You have called us to respond to. We are grieved by our inability to have effected a more positive outcome. By faith we cast the stress and burdens of this experience upon You, trusting that You, in Your time, will bring us to a peace that passes understanding as You have promised. Amen.

Please do express any part of what you are feeling and experiencing in your talk with God. That may include anger, frustration, guilt, etc. He knows it all and promises to walk through these toughest calls with you. Here are a couple of His promises that we can hold on to: "Come unto Me all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest" and "Do not be anxious about anything, but by prayer present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which passes understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus".



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
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
