### LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The State's 10 Year Sealed Battery Smoke Detector law is going into effect January 1st and IFA Lobbyist Margaret Vaughn has been working with the IL Fire Safety to continue their public awareness campaign with press conferences held at various fire departments this fall. The Niles Fire Dept received an award on

October 6th for installing over 1000 of the 10 Year Smoke Detectors through the "Be Alarmed" program, which is joint venture between the Illinois Fire Safety Alliance and the Office of the State Fire Marshal. The Be Alarmed program distributes fire safety education materials and 10-year battery detectors to participating fire departments which then deliver the educational material and install smoke alarms in at-risk homes within their communities.

#### **UPDATED ILLINOIS SMOKE ALARM LAW**

- Effective January 1, 2023 -

In 2017, the Illinois Fire Safety Alliance worked with the General Assembly to pass a law which will require Illinois residents to replace their old smoke alarms with the type that has a long-term, 10-year sealed battery beginning January 1, 2023. This would apply to residents that are still using alarms with removable batteries or alarms that are not hardwired.



#### What is the Updated Illinois Smoke Alarm Law?

- Since 1988, all dwellings in Illinois have been required to have smoke alarms.
- In 2017, Public Act 100-0200 was passed to update the Illinois Smoke Detector Act to reflect advances in alarm technology.
- Come January 1, 2023, any new smoke alarm being installed within a single or muti-family home are required to be featured with a 10-year sealed battery.
- Smoke alarms in single or multi-family homes prior to January 1, 2023 may remain in place until they exceed 10 years from their manufactured date, fails to respond to operability tests, or otherwise malfunctions.

#### **Exemptions**

- Homes built after 1988 that already have hardwired smoke alarms.
- Homes with wireless integrated alarms that use low-power radio frequency communications, Wi-Fi, or other Wireless Local Area Networking capability.

## Appellate Court: Governments Can Redact a FOIA Requestor's Own Private Information

The Illinois Appellate Court recently upheld a city's decision to redact a Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA") requestor's own private information in response to a FOIA request.

In *Warren v. City of Urbana*, the requestor, Trent Warren, submitted a request to the City of Urbana seeking public records for a property and an updated Area-wide Records Management System ("ARMS") Report for Warren. 2022 IL App (4th) 210564-U. The requested records included Warren's home address, home phone number, and date of birth. They also included his mother's home address and home phone number.

Under Sections 7(1)(b) and (c) of FOIA, that information qualifies as private and personal and is thus exempt from disclosure. Thus, citing those Sections, the City provided the requested information with the private information redacted.

Warren filed a request for review with the Public Access Counselor ("PAC") claiming it was inappropriate for the City to redact his private information. He contended that, after all, it was his personal information, so there was no privacy concern. He additionally argued that the City failed to provide a sufficient factual basis for its redaction of the information.

The PAC determined that no further inquiry was necessary and closed the matter. Warren then filed a lawsuit (without a lawyer) alleging that the City violated FOIA when it redacted his private and personal information because his consent was implied from the request. The circuit court dismissed the complaint and found no basis for a challenge to the City's response in the FOIA statute.

The appellate court agreed. The court determined that the statute provided an express exemption to the disclosure of private and personal information. The only applicable exception was when disclosure was required by another provision of FOIA, a state or federal law, or a court order. There was no other provision, law, or order that required the disclosure of Warren's personal and private information. Last, the court held that the City provided sufficient reasoning for the redactions by citing the applicable sections of FOIA. As a result, the court found that the City acted in accordance with the law.

This case affirms that there is no obligation on the part of local government entities to provide information that is otherwise subject to redaction in response to a FOIA request unless the information is required to be disclosed by another provision of FOIA, a state or federal law, or a court order. This is true even if it is the party's own private information. Similarly, a simple reference to the statutory provision allowing for the redaction of information is a sufficient explanation for the redaction under FOIA. #### **Driving Tips for Bad, Terrible, No-Good Weather**

According to the Federal Highway Administration, more than 1 in 5 car accidents in the U.S. happen because of adverse weather or slick road conditions. These crashes claim the lives of nearly 5,000 people annually and injure 418,000 more. Severe weather inhibits drivers' visibility, reaction time and capabilities, while also affecting vehicle performance, pavement condition and road quality. Use the following tips to stay safer out there, no matter the weather.

For all conditions below, remember to always:

- 1. Slow down. Reducing speed gives you more time to react, as well as lowers your chances of skidding or colliding.
- **2. Give room to other vehicles.** Besides impaired visibility, bad weather means slower braking time. Experts recommend doubling your following distance.
- **3. Pull over if necessary.** In many cases, the worst weather passes through. It's best to pull safely off the road (preferably to a parking lot) and wait it out.

Here are some tips for specific weather elements:

#### Wind

Strong wind doesn't just come with storms. It can occur anywhere—open spaces, tunnels, overpasses, bridges and elsewhere.

- Maintain firm grip on the wheel
- Anticipate gusts
- Keep an eye on large vehicles

#### Fog

Foggy conditions are especially hazardous, no matter your driving experience. Fog also makes it difficult to gauge speed, so slowing down is extra important.

- Use low-beam headlights, never brights
- Watch the road (not the car in front of you)
- Use your wipers and the defroster for better visibility

#### Rain

Heavy rain can come out of nowhere, quickly affecting visibility. When combined with road flooding or standing water, you have a recipe for hydroplaning.

- Avoid hydroplaning by slowing down
- Turn on your headlights
- Be sure to add that extra following time behind the car in front of you

#### Snow and Ice

Ice and snow on pavement are extremely dangerous, especially when they begin to melt. That meltwater makes roads extra slick, reducing tire traction.

- Slower is better; also avoid quick stops and turns
- Use low-beams as needed
- Keep windshield and windows clear

#### Hail

Hail storms are usually brief but can cause a lot of damage in those few minutes.

- Get off the road asap
- Stay in your car to avoid injury

Knowing what to do in bad weather goes a long way toward keeping you safe. Better yet, plan ahead and check the weather *before* your trip—you may be safest postponing or delaying your departure time.



### From the Chaplain's Rack

#### IFA Chaplain Josh Ehrler



Recently I was sitting in a chaplain training that included social workers. It was a nice cross pollination of resources that opened my mind to new techniques and ideas. We chappies learned what social workers offer in crisis situations (connections to resources, longer follow-ups, facilitation of mental and other organizations) and we were able to articulate our role.

What was interesting, and a good reminder for us fire chaplains, was the assumption that our primary role is to pray with people. That we are arriving on scene to reflect our religious backgrounds and be a religious presence. I suspect that for many, this is the going

assumption. I very much suspect this is a prevalent assumption within the fire service. Hence resistance in some houses to creating a fire chaplain role in the department. By far not the only reason, but definitely one.

Let's talk about that cross on my badge. I can tell you about psychological and spiritual first aid, CISM and defusing work, resilience skills, all that. Still, sometimes all anyone will see is that cross. Or, if you are fortunate to serve in a larger population, it might be a Star of David. Or a crescent moon. Or any symbol of the chaplain's faith affiliation. Not all chappies are Christian.

I am Christian. Specifically Lutheran Christian. My fulltime gig is to be the Lutheran pastor of a great congregation in this town I serve. They have allowed me to disappear out the door when the tone drops and this church is supportive of our fire department.

My chaplaincy is oriented by my faith in God and my belief in Christ. With that said, I cannot remember the last time I prayed at a scene. As in, intentionally gathered up a family and prayed with them. I will absolutely do that if asked, but I have never offered it on my own.

We live in a world of high skepticism, and rightly so. People have used the cross (my religious symbol) as a weapon, a pry bar to force people to move a certain way, as a sign of guilt, and as an excuse to use a tragic event as an opportunity to invite people to a church. I have seen it on scene. Maybe you have, too. If not at a scene, maybe during some other moment of fragility and social/emotional weakness.


Skepticism is what keeps us safe physically and emotionally. It is absolutely rational to not want some dogooder preacher type wandering the bays looking for ways to get more people into their church. Or any church.

I am sorry if that has been your experience of so-called fire chaplains. Speaking for colleagues of mine who have been doing good work with that title, we wish it wasn't that way. Yes, we carry a faith in our God in the form that shapes us. Yet, that is not our primary job in a department. Our responsibility is to keep up our training, to keep seeking quality resources for firefighters and residents in crisis, to listen with confidentiality, and fundamentally to serve our fellow fire and EMS personnel. I would argue an effective fire chaplain makes their religious orientation secondary. Not irrelevant or unnecessary, but not ahead of the needs of who we are called to encounter and aid. My faith gives me the freedom to not have to worry or care what religious affiliation-including atheism-another person has. My faith, and my training, frees me up to focus on the task at hand-to respond to someone or a group that is in crisis, and offer every skill and resource I've gained to give them even a slight sense of balance in the midst of chaos.


## Regular Fire Sprinkler Testing is Required by the International Fire Code

Chapter 9, Fire Protection Systems of the 2018 International Fire Code requires water based fire protection systems to be inspected, tested and maintained at regular intervals in accordance with NFPA 25: Standard for the Inspection, Testing and Maintenance of Water-Based Fire Protection Systems.

Regular testing is also required through the Illinois Office of the State Fire Marshal's adoption of NFPA 101: Life Safety Code, Section 9.11.1 (2015 edition).

All automatic fire sprinkler systems, stand-pipe systems and fire pumps must be inspected and maintained in accordance with NFPA 25.

Beginning in January 2023, be ready to enforce the NICET III minimum requirement by showing the legislation to your contractors who work in your town.







Any company must be licensed by the State Fire Marshal and anyone testing a fire sprinkler system, standpipe or fire pump must have (1) satisfactorily completed a certified sprinkler fitter apprenticeship program approved by the U.S. Department of Labor, or (2) have current ASSE 15010 certification in inspection, testing, and maintenance for water-based fire protection systems by ASSE, or (3) current NICET II (NICET III by Jan 2023) certification or equivalent nationally recognized program. Are you checking these items before work begins? Stop any job violating this state law and/or call the state fire marshal.

#### Office of the State Fire Marshal



The Office of the Illinois State Fire Marshal has a new Fire Service Outreach Coordinator, Lee Buxton. Lee is no stranger to the agency as he previously served in the role of Fire Certification Specialist in the Personnel Standards and Education Division. Lee just retired as a Captain on the Urbana Fire Department where he served for a little over 24 years. Captain Buxton spent the last year serving as acting Battalion Chief for the third shift crew and was one of the only members on the department to hold the designation of Chief


The OSFM can't stress enough the importance that all departments/districts across the state keep their NFIRS data current as this can cause them to become ineligible to receive grants and loans, not only from the OSFM, but also from federal sources. You can check to see if your department/district's NFIRS reports are current by visiting our website at sfm.illinois.gov, click on the resources tab, then click on grants and loans, and scroll down on the page to NFIRS Compliance. If you have any questions, please feel free to reach out to our office.

As we enter the holiday season many residents will be decking the halls. According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) more than two of every five home decoration fires occur due to decorations being placed too close to a heat source. More than one-third of home decoration fires are started by candles. The NFPA also reports that US fire departments responded to an average of 780 home structure fires per year that began with decorations between 2013-2017.

More than half of home decoration fires in December are started by candles. Candle fires peak in December followed closely by January. The top three days for home candle fires are Christmas Day, New Year's Day and New Year's Eve. Before you head to bed or out for the evening, extinguish all lit candles. Here are some tips to keep in mind to stay fire safe when decking the halls this holiday season.

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Make sure decorations are either flame retardant or flame resistant.
- Keep lit candles at least 12 inches away from decorations or anything that can catch fire.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Extinguish all lit candles before going to bed or leaving the house.
- Check to make sure your lights are rated for indoor or outdoor use or both.
- Replace any light strands that have worn or broken cords. Make sure to read the recommendation for number of light strings you can string together.
- Turn off all light strings and decorations before leaving home or going to bed.
- If you have a real Christmas tree, make sure to check water levels daily! It is not unusual for a tree to drink two gallons of water the first day it is in the stand.
- Keep real Christmas trees away from a heat source. It can dry out the tree quickly.


After a busy cooking day on Thanksgiving, before firing the oven back up preparing the next holiday meal, make sure to clean it! In case of an oven fire, turn off the oven and keep the door closed until it is cool. Clean cook tops as left-over grease can catch fire. Thanksgiving is the peak day for home cooking fires, but Christmas and Christmas Eve follow closely behind. Happy Holidays from the OSFM.




